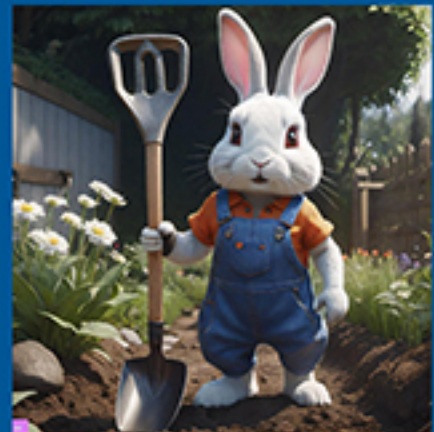





WINSTON IS NOT AN ORDINARY RABBIT

When Wendy helps in the kitchen, Winston loves to watch. He imagines making carrot salad in a big bowl for them to share. The recipe is simple — mostly freshly grated carrots. He likes his plain, Wendy adds a dressing to hers.

Recipe for Carrot Salad

1 cup of shredded carrots

1/3 cup of raisins

1 Tablespoon mayonnaise

1/2 teaspoon lemon juice

A pinch of salt

Divide the shredded carrots into two bowls.

For Wendy's salad:

Mix the shredded carrots and raisins together. For the dressing, whisk lemon juice, mayonnaise, and salt in a small bowl and pour over the carrot mixture - stir until carrots and raisins are coated. Chill for 30 minutes in refrigerator.

For Winston's bowl, just use the shredded carrots — he likes his plain.





Winston likes to help his friends with their tasks, like gathering acorns for the winter with Rufus, his squirrel buddy.



When Winston hears music playing, he loves to twist, wiggle, and do the "bunny hop" like all rabbits love to do. But Winston adds an acrobatics flip to his motion. Winston is no ordinary rabbit!




Wendy is learning to draw and paint. She practices her art after school at home. Winston likes to watch her being creative and using colors.



Special Day! Winston's Birthday!
Winston doesn't know his real birthday of course, but he knows when he came home with Wendy, and that is the day he wants to remember. He invites his friends and they share delicious carrot cake and carrot juice outside in the sunshine for a real celebration.



After the party, Winston just wants to relax. He looks forward to his next year and all the adventures he might get to share with his friends.
